From Fr. Carefoote

As I stood by the window in the vestry this morning, some tentative sunshine suddenly broke through the unrelenting cloud of the last few days, and I was dazzled, for a few brief moments, by the



cavalcade of colour down below. Tulips in their wide varieties waved back at me in the breeze, the last of the daffodils were still bravely turning towards the sun, a late-blooming magnolia was holding onto its pale pink petals, while the cherry blossoms looked on, just awaiting their turn to make the rest of the garden jealous. As is so very often the case, without my willing it, a tune came into my head, Sarah McLachlan's *Ordinary Miracle*. "The sky knows when it's time to snow, don't need to teach a seed to grow. It's just another ordinary miracle today." The spring garden has always been a miraculous thing to me, as nature comes back to life. It's not that winter doesn't have its own beauty, for it does, but it is a season that tends to paint its canvas in shades of grey. As the leaves on the trees now begin to turn from pale to dark green, however, we can take comfort in knowing that these few precious months of warmth and long days are all ahead of us, as is the season of Pentecost, which we are now entering.

In some parts of the Christian world, this long period between now and the first Sunday of Advent, which falls this year on December 3rd, is known by the rather prosaic title of "Ordinary Time". I used to think that name terribly dull, but it actually speaks volumes when you think about it. It is a reminder to us all that it is precisely in ordinary times that God's Spirit still works the greatest of miracles through very ordinary people. The Spirit clearly moves so many in this parish to work ordinary miracles every day on behalf of the lonely, shut-ins, our neighbours in need, and refugees struggling to adapt to their new circumstances, to name but a few. Sunday after Sunday, the Gospels we will now hear throughout this new season will focus our attention specifically on Jesus's teachings. By carefully listening to his words and putting them into action, we may well find that, by the end of this season of growth, we too may have produced the fruits of the Spirit which St. Paul tells us are love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Gal. 5:22-23). Not a bad yield, when you think about it. Whether we are in the city, travelling, or at the cottage, there will be no shortage of opportunities to make this garden of ours grow.

St. Martin's is now entering into a new and exciting period in its long and vibrant history. Father Philip's legacy will leave a lasting imprint on the evolution of the parish as it moves into the future, something for which we are all grateful. I am sure that he would be the first to say that while his work here may be done, ours most certainly is not. It is my privilege to be able to accompany the people of this parish during this time of transition. Like so many priests of this diocese, my faith was also shaped by St. Martin's when I was a parishioner and chorister here in the 1990s, and I am so very happy to have the opportunity to give back to it. The fact that I still see so many familiar faces from twenty-five years ago bears witness to the commitment of those who have called St. Martin's their home for so very long. The fact that I see so many *new* faces here as well is testimony to the effect that inspiring liturgy, sound religious education, and good works done in Christ's name can have on building a strong faith community. No doubt, over these next few months, you will all be reflecting on the direction you wish to see St. Martin's move as you face the challenges of a post-pandemic church, and they are many. Pray, therefore, for your selection committee that the Spirit might enlighten them as they work on your behalf to find the person who will guide you into the promise of the future while respecting the traditions of your past.

In the long weeks of Pentecost that lie before us, let us try, both personally and as a parish, to make the most of the ordinary. While the Easter Season we are leaving behind cannot help but impress upon our hearts and minds the exceptional work of God who raised his Son from the dead, let us not forget that most of Jesus' ministry before that salvific act was spent in teaching, comforting, healing, and encouraging ordinary people in an ordinary country – acts of love that turned the ordinary into the extraordinary. Even in smallest things we do for others, may we be part of the ordinary miracle today.

Parish Profile: Father PJ Carefoote

Pearce James (PJ) Carefoote was born in East York and grew up in the east end of Toronto. He has two older sisters, one now living in Florida and the other by Lake Simcoe. They thought Pearce too old a name for a baby, so he became PI at once and ever since. His father who lives in Scarborough was from an Irish

Anglican family, but not a churchgoing one. His mother, who died 30 years ago, was from an Irish Roman Catholic family who were more devout. PJ started at St. Joseph's School, then went to St. Michael's Choir School for grades 3 to 13 where he had a good education, both generally and musically. After a BA at St. Michael's College at U of T, he attended St. Augustine's Seminary for theology. St. Augustine's is in Scarborough but is part of the Toronto School of Theology and he took many courses downtown with students of other denominations. He was ordained a Roman Catholic priest in 1988.

Fr Carefoote's first parish was St. Mary's in Brampton where he was one of three priests ministering to a parish of 5,000 families (families, not individuals!), five grade schools, two high schools, and two prisons. He loved it.

He was there only two years when Cardinal Carter decided to send him back to university with a plan that he would return to teach church history at St. Augustine's. He studied at the Catholic University of Louvain in Belgium, eventually defending a doctoral degree in 1996. His area of study was the transition from the ancient to the medieval church, around the time of St. Augustine.

But there were also problems. He began to have doubts about returning to teach in the Roman

Catholic church, potentially contributing to that church's approach to gay priests. When he asked Archbishop Ambrozic, Cardinal Carter's successor, for time to think and revealed his own sexuality, it was not well received. PJ left the active Roman Catholic priesthood in 1994.

He needed a job. He sang as a paid lead tenor at the Church of the Redeemer (Anglican) but continued to attend mass at St. Joan of Arc RC church. It was there that he met Kevin Kindellan, now his partner. However, PJ did not like the music at St. Joan of Arc and it was suggested that he try St. Martin-in-the-Fields, just up the street. He first came in about 1996, met Fr. Pritchard, and loved the music and the liturgy. Soon he asked Jack to join the choir and sang with them for many years.

PJ and Kevin occasionally visited other churches and attended the 9 am service at the St. James Cathedral. It was there in 2010 that PJ was received into the Anglican Church. His orders were reactivated in 2013 and he joined the cathedral clergy.

Back to 1994. Singing was not a full-time job, so PJ got a teaching degree and then a position at the Etobicoke School of the Arts, teaching voice, music history, general history, and world religions. Eventually, he was asked to consider taking on the school library. In preparation for that, he enrolled in the Master of Information program at U of T. One of his courses was in rare books and special collections. He was noticed and in 2001 was offered a job in the Thomas Fisher Rare Book Library. It was an ideal job. It used his knowledge of history, theology, Latin, and Greek, and he was free on weekends! He was there 20 years and Head for the last five of those, retiring in December 2021.

On retirement from U of T, PJ asked for a parish close to home and was appointed honorary assistant at St. Olave's, the parish he lives in. He is still active academically, giving some lectures and interviews on one of his interests, censorship and banning of books.

A long path with many turns —and more university degrees than most — that brings Fr PJ Carefoote happily to be our interim priest at St. Martin's. We are pleased to welcome him back.



We are recommending two picks for Summer 2023:




- Gilead, a novel by

Anglican Church of Canada since 2019. For the last
four years I have sat on the Council of General
Synod and the Faith Worship and Ministry
coordinating committee of the national church.

I was homeschooled and have a grounding in biblical studies through courses in the Creation Care Studies Program in Belize, the Outtatown Discipleship School through Canadian Mennonite University, lay education courses taught by the Biblical Scholar in Residence at St. James Anglican Church in Fenelon Falls, and through the online educational community Bible Remixed, where I have provided technical support for the last three years. Being raised by two biblical theologians, Brian Walsh and Sylvia Keesmaat, has meant that the biblical story has been alive in the conversations of our home, and in the family choices that have shaped me.

Outside of my work and volunteer time in the church, I am passionate about advocacy, especially for the 2SLGBTQ+ community and the disabled community. I also look after my ten-year-old neighbour after school every day and spend most of

It's rewarding for a number of reasons - first to provide funds that will be distributed to the sixteen **FaithWorks** partners who last year served 27,000 people. We continue to hear of the food insecurity that so many, including some of our neighbours, are coping with: 17,746 people in

our diocese were fed, sheltered, nurtured, and befriended by the FaithWorks partners. You may recall that 15% of the funds that those walking raise stays within the parish for our local partners such as Romero House, The Redwood, Feed it Forward, and PARC.

Taking part in the Walkathon is also rewarding because it is an event that everyone in the

As well, everyone who is able can sponsor one or more of the walkers. It's a wonderful example of community fellowship.

Update On the Refugee Sponsorship of Tariq A. and His Family

By Andrew Everton, Chair, Refugee Support Group As previously reported in *The Lychgate*, St. Martin's and AURA (Anglican United Refugee Alliance) have entered into a co-sponsorship agreement to bring Tariq A. (not his real name) and his family to Canada with financial and on-the-ground support from the Canadian charity Books Over Borders.

After safely leaving Afghanistan in February, the family has settled in Islamabad, Pakistan. We are pleased to report that at the time of writing, the family is scheduled for an interview with the High Commission of Canada in Islamabad. AURA will be

providing assistance to help them prepare for the interview.

After interviews, the next step is to have security checks and exit visas secured. There is also a possibility that the family could be required to have medical follow-ups. While there are no set timelines for these processes, the applications are moving forward relatively quickly because the family's applications are under the Canadian government's special program for Afghan refugees.

You may recall that Tariq worked with the Canadian charity Books Over Borders to promote literacy and education throughout Afghanistan. Following the handover of power to the Taliban, Tariq's safe well-being could no longer be guaranteed. Unfortunately, this harsh reality has impacted his family. One of his brothers was recently detained by the Taliban for continuing to advocate for girls' education. Tariq is working diligently to secure his brother's safe release.

The sponsorship group is turning its attention to raising the minimum funds required to support the family during their first year in Canada. The target is \$75,000, of which \$55,000 has been secured.


